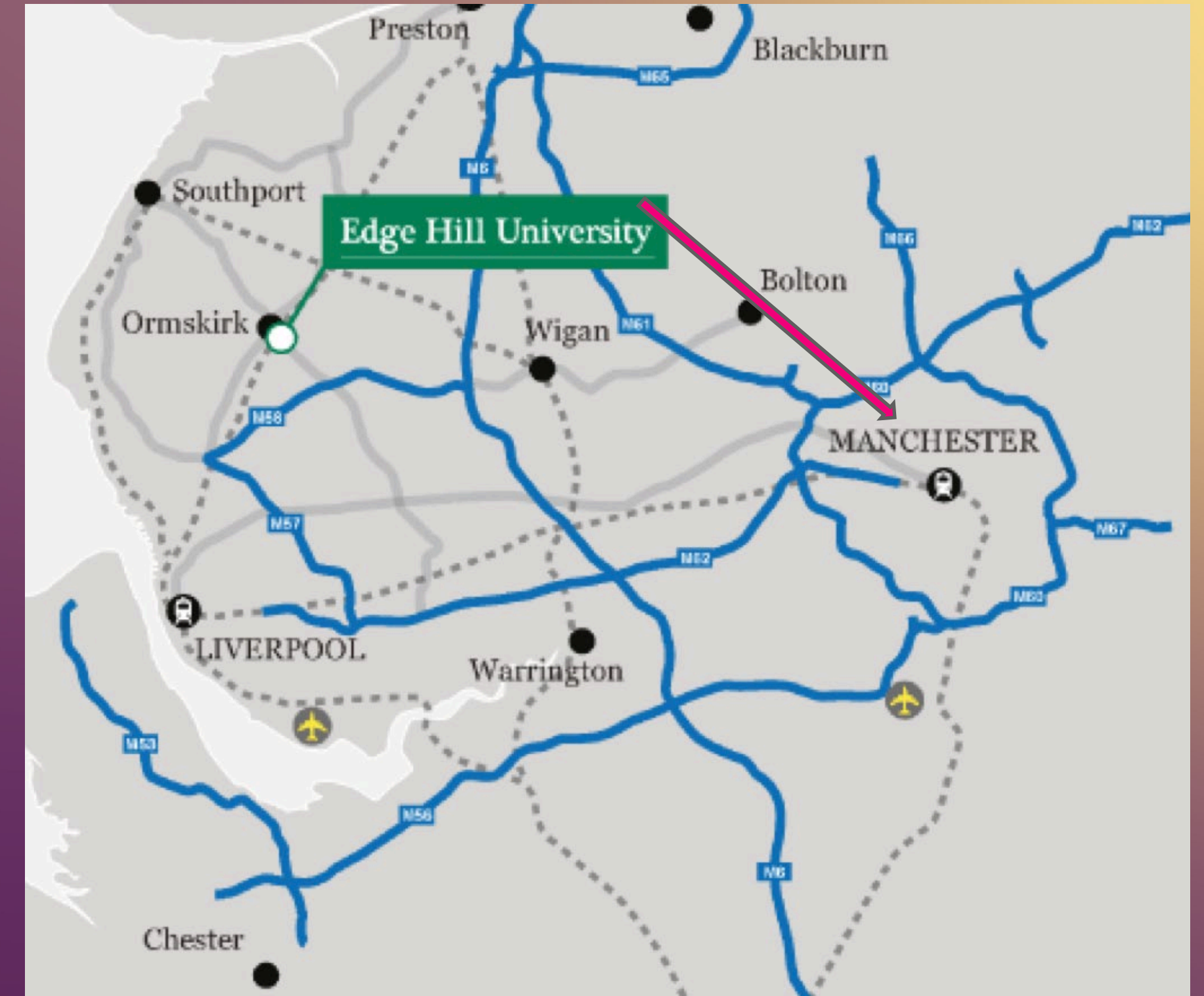

50%theory/50% clinical practice
3 years full time study
3 year plan/timetable

What is a Paramedic?



‘A paramedic works autonomously as a generalist clinician across a range of healthcare settings, usually in emergency, primary or urgent care.

They may also specialise in clinical practice, education, leadership or research.’

The College of Paramedics (2019)

Paramedics are:

- Registered healthcare professionals

Have a unique role that crosses:

- healthcare,
- public health,
- social care and
- public safety

Most well-known for working within:

- Ambulance Services providing immediate and emergency care in response to 999 calls

But.... also work in other areas of healthcare

The paramedic profession has evolved from being a provider of emergency treatment and transportation in an ambulance to a provider of mobile healthcare.

As a result of this evolution, paramedics can now be found working in multiple settings including: general practice, minor injury units, urgent care centres, walk-in centres and accident and emergency (A&E) departments, telehealth and telecare services and in remote and offshore sectors.

Paramedics in some of these settings often undertake advanced clinical assessments and take the responsibility for the ongoing care provided to patients, in addition to onward referral and discharge.

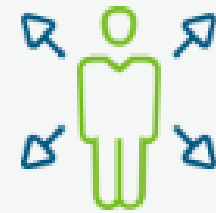
• Essential Skills

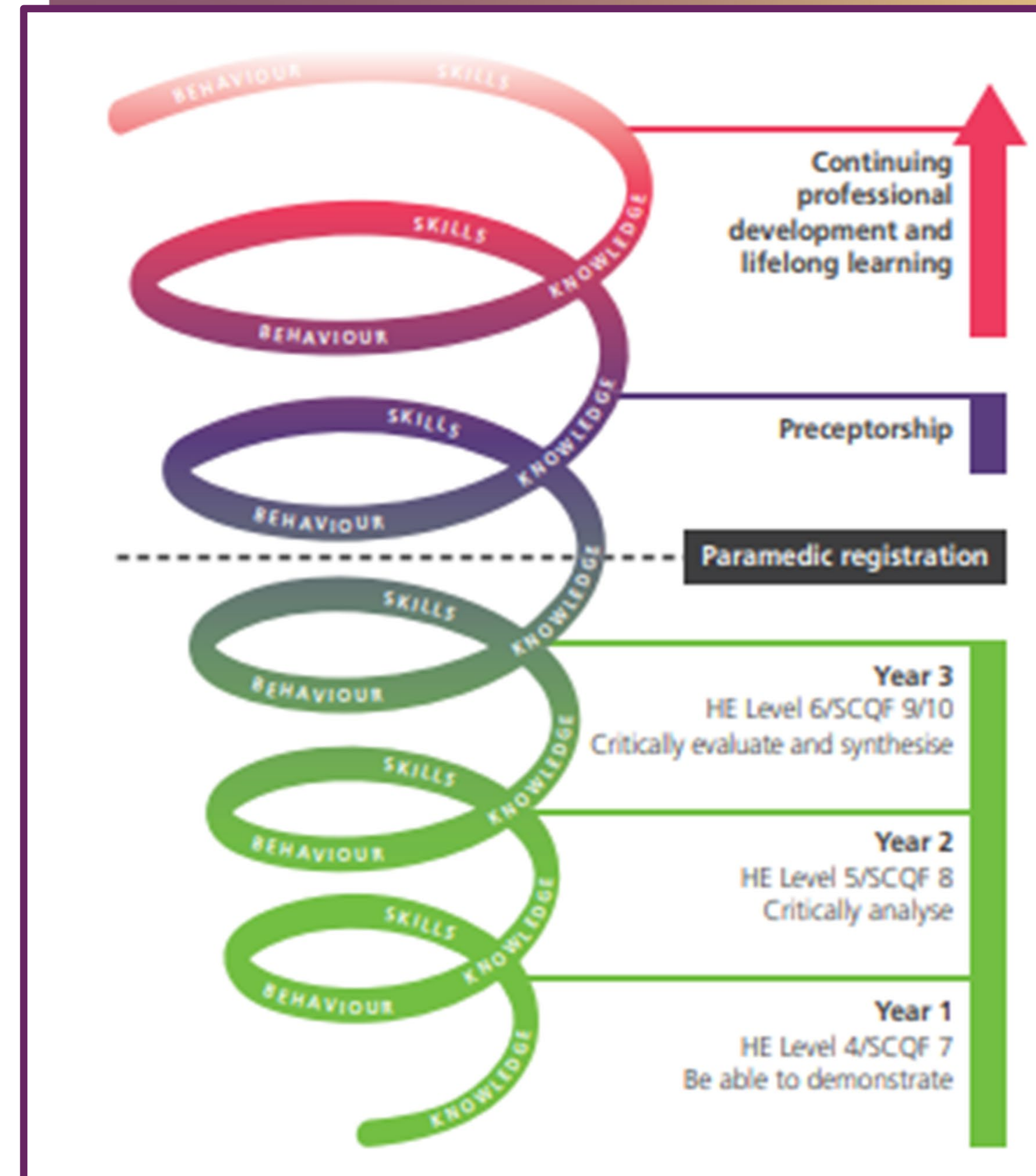
